#### THE CROSS




This symbol of sacrifice is also the symbol of the love of Christ that lives on and conquers all. When we love God, we love our neighbours as ourselves.

The educational goals of the College, in accordance with its mission, may be described as:

- To cultivate a healthy attitude to life and the world and to expose students to the Christian message.
- To inculcate civic awareness in students and to help them develop into responsible and useful citizens with respect for intellectual property, human rights, freedom and justice.
- To enable students to develop their intellectual potential fully, to think logically and creatively, to study and solve problems independently, and to communicate effectively in English and Chinese.
- To develop students' skills and abilities in Information Technology and to arouse their interest in life-long learning.
- To develop students' physical and musical skills and abilities and to encourage enjoyment in physical development and aesthetic appreciation.
- To encourage the appreciation of the arts and development of artistic talents and skills.
- To promote respect for the views and opinions of others, harmonious relationships in school, the family and the community, and participation in community affairs.
- To develop in students the ability to cope with adverse situations and emotional problems.





#### HISTORY

'To grow a tree takes a decade; to nurture talent takes a century.' A few years before the official founding of St. Paul's College in 1851, the Reverend Vincent Stanton, the first Anglican Chaplain in Hong Kong, opened a school where both English and Chinese were taught. The school was called 'St. Paul's College' and was situated at Glenealy. After the Second World War, the site, which we shared with Bishop's House, was no longer adequate. We thus moved to our present site on Bonham Road, opposite the University of Hong Kong.

## 1842 - 1861

#### **Hong Kong Roots**

St. Paul's College was established for missionary work and growing talent. Its earliest students included Tong Mow Chee, Wu Ting Fang and other members of the Chinese elite.

#### Anglican clergymen arrived in Hong Kong

The Church of England appointed the Revd Vincent Stanton to Hong Kong. He used funds raised in Britain to establish an Anglo-Chinese school for the Chinese population, hoping that graduates would join the clergy or contribute in other ways to society. In 1845, he was granted a plot of land by the government (at Tit Kong, now known as Glenealy) to build St. Paul's College. The first College building was erected in 1847, and classes began in 1849.

#### 1851

## St. Paul's College was officially founded, and assisted the government in

The school was officially established in 1851 as St. Paul's College. In the same year, the Foreign Office permitted the Superintendent of British Trade in China to give the College an annual grant of \$1,200 for training interpreters, with the condition that six students per year would be nominated as interpreters by the governor. As a result, traditional Chinese schools aided by the government began to refer prospective students to St. Paul's College. Candidates were selected every six months through a series of examinations

After each round of examinations, 7 to 13 students were selected, and a scholarship was awarded to the student with the highest score. This marked the beginning of public examinations in Hong Kong.



On 24 November 2021, St. Paul's College sent the framed rubbing with the College name and the early motto of the College, "Love the Lord with all your heart, and love your neighbour as yourself" as gifts to Bishop's House (the founding premises of St. Paul's College). The rubbing was presented by Dr. Arnold Cheng Cheuk Sang, Chairman of the College Council, and his team on behalf of St. Paul's Dr. Affiold Cheight Cheur Sang, Chairman or the Conge County, and Provincial Archivist, the Revd Dr. Philip L. Wickeri. The rubbing was later transferred to the Hong Kong Sheng Kung Hui Archives (HKSKH

## 1862 - 1904

#### The Rise to Prominence

The College nurtured a wealth of Chinese talents, including Wang Ch'ung-hui, Chan Ayin, and Mok Sau Tseng.

#### 1876

#### St. Paul's College joined the Grant-in-Aid Scheme

The College fell under Category 4 of the Scheme, as a school that taught a European curriculum in European languages, including Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Grammar, History, Geography, etc.

#### 1901

#### St. Paul's College restructured into a seminary



Bishop Joseph Charles Hoare restructured St. Paul's College and suspended its Anglo-Chinese section. The restructuring effectively turned the school into a seminary for only training Chinese clergymen, in collaboration with the Church Missionary Society.

## 1905 - 1942

#### **Growing with the Times**

During this period, St. Paul's College responded to the community's clamour for a re-establishment of Anglo-Chinese education. The College also ran free evening schools. It nurtured many talents for Hong Kong, such as S.K. Yee, I.M. Pei, Chung Sze Yuen, Lai Man Wai and Sit Kok Sin.

#### 1909

#### St. Paul's College resumed Anglo-Chinese education

The Church Missionary Society decided to relocate the seminary to Guangzhou, while Anglo-Chinese education was reintroduced to St. Paul's College. The College adopted a new motto, "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom". During this period, the College's enrolment increased considerably. It also emphasised physical education. Between the 1910s and 1930s, the College underwent several expansions to build a church, a hostel, and playgrounds to cater for needs

#### 1916

## St. Paul's College boarding students began running free evening schools

St. Paul's students taught and ran free evening schools. In addition to the campus in Glenealy, these were also operated in Aberdeen, Tai Hang and other locations to serve children of underprivileged families.

#### 1912

### St. Paul's College began issuing graduation certificates in Chinese

St. Paul's College became one of the first English schools in Hong Kong to issue graduation certificates in Chinese.

#### 1941

#### St. Paul's teachers and students defended Hong Kong

Classes at the College were suspended following the Japanese invasion on 8 December. Principal Evan George Stewart, who also served in the Hong Kong Volunteer Defence Corps (HKVDC), led St. Paul's staff and students in the city's defence. During the Japanese occupation, some teachers and students also participated in Allied anti-Japanese underground operations in Hong Kong.

## 1945 - 1980

#### **Response to Social Demand**

An evening school was established and additional buildings were built to accommodate more primary and secondary students. St. Paul's College continued to nurture outstanding talents who served Hong Kong in the political, academic, business, medical, social welfare, and performing arts sectors.

#### 1945

#### St. Paul's College temporarily merged with St. Paul's Girls College to

After the Second World War, St. Paul's College was amalgamated with St. Paul's Girls' College on MacDonnell Road to temporarily form a coeducational joint college, with elementary and secondary sections and kindergarten classes to meet a surge in demand for education in the postwar era. This arrangement lasted until 1950.

#### 1950

#### St. Paul's College reopened as a boys' school

St. Paul's College reopened as a boys' school in September, after taking over the former site of St. John's College (of the University of Hong Kong) on Bonham Road as its new campus.

#### 1960

## St. Paul's College Primary School (SPCPS) was established and the number of classes in the secondary section / division was increased

From the 1910s to the 1950s, St. Paul's College only offered classes as low as Primary 5. In 1960, the primary classes expanded to a six-year primary section, and became independent from the secondary section. In the same

year, the secondary section of the College began to expand, with the number of Form 1 classes increasing from two to six.

Due to a lack of space on the existing school premises, the College underwent a redevelopment project from 1963 to 1969.

(The primary section originally shared the Bonham Road premises with the secondary section until 1992, when it moved to Hill Road. In 2013, it moved to its current site on Pok Fu Lam Road.)

#### 1962

#### St. Paul's College established various music groups and courses

Mr. (later the Revd) Moses Wu helped establish a number of music groups and courses, including the Senior and Intermediate Choirs, the String Orchestra, and classes in violin, music theory, recorder, harmonica, etc., which have won numerous prizes at the Hong Kong Schools Music Festival and other competitions since the 1960s, and have since formed a musical tradition at the College.

#### 1963

#### St. Paul's College Students' Association was established

The College's Students' Association is one of Hong Kong's earlier secondary school student organisations, with the founding aims of promoting extracurricular activities, coordinating existing extracurricular groups, and allowing students more autonomy in organising their own activities. Sixty years on, the SA has become an indispensable platform for student clubs. Affiliated clubs cover a wide range of interests, from philosophy to contract bridge; they offer opportunities for joint school collaboration, encourage students to take their first steps into society, and constantly continue to inspire their future paths.

#### 1968

#### The College co-curated the Joint School Science Exhibition

Students from St. Paul's College and nine other secondary schools organised the first Joint School Science Exhibition to promote scientific education.

#### 1970

#### Visually impaired students were admitted to St. Paul's College

St. Paul's College began to admit visually impaired students from Ebenezer School and Home for the Visually Impaired. As of 2024, a total of 50 students had been admitted. In 2007, the College pioneered inclusive education in Hong Kong by offering an internship for the first visually impaired teacher in Hong Kong.

## 1981 - Present

#### **Pursuing Progress while Ensuring Stability**

As in the past, St. Paul's College has continued to achieve excellent results in public examinations and was transformed into a Direct Subsidy Scheme (DSS) school in the early 21st century.

#### 1985

#### The first Putonghua class was introduced at St. Paul's College

In view of the signing of the Sino-British Joint Declaration, Principal Timothy Ha Wing Ho introduced the use of Putonghua in Chinese lessons at the College, pioneering the use of Putonghua in secondary schools in Hong Kong.

#### 1995

#### St. Paul's College's first overseas study tour took place

St. Paul's College started organising overseas study tours to broaden students' horizons. In 2002, the College launched the Global Classroom programme, and expanded the scale of study tours to include all academic departments, with visits to the Chinese mainland, Europe, the United States, etc.

#### 2002

#### St. Paul's College was converted to a DSS school

The secondary section of St. Paul's College opted to become a DSS school, making the College one of the first schools to join the DSS. The first DSS students enrolled in September 2002. The primary section of the College followed suit the next year.

#### 2002-2010

#### The school underwent several improvement projects

The seventh floor of the East Wing was added in 2002 and the new South Wing was completed in 2006 to replace the former Primary School building. The College renovated the Wong Ming Him Hall in 2008 and the College Hall in 2010, adding computers and a rehearsal space to prepare the school for the educational needs of the 21st century.

#### 2012

The last batch of Hong Kong A-Level (HKALE) students graduated and the first batch of students took the HKDSE

With the termination of HKALE, St. Paul's College ceased admitting girls and became an all-boys school.

#### 2018

## St. Paul's College launched the School Enhancement Project and provided a new pathway to higher education

St. Paul's College announced a series of renovations and enhancements to update the campus and improve the teaching environment, which aligned with recent education reforms and upheld the tradition of focusing on off-campus learning to prepare for future challenges.

That same year, St. Paul's College introduced the International Advanced Levels (IAL) programme to provide students with an alternative pathway to higher education.

#### 2021

#### The College celebrated its 170th Anniversary. (1851-2021)

#### **MANAGEMENT STAFF**

Spearheading the College Council is the Chairman, Dr. CHENG Cheuk Sang Arnold, who – with the assistance of the Supervisor Mr. PONG Yuen Sun Louis – is dedicated to giving the College his undivided and generous support. The Principal, assisted by the Assistant Vice Principals, is in charge of the administration of the College. Teachers are allocated to various functional roles to help plan and implement College policies.

At St. Paul's, we recognise how important it is to develop our staff. Our teachers are keen to develop themselves professionally not just in pedagogy and subject knowledge, but also in other areas such as administration, leadership and counselling. Teachers have attended workshops, seminars and courses organised by the Education Bureau (EDB), the Education University of Hong Kong (EdUHK) and other tertiary institutions such as Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT).

#### **SCHOOL FACILITIES**

Situated opposite the University of Hong Kong, the College offers a pleasant environment conducive to learning, along with ample facilities for the all-round development of students.

- College Hall: Renovated and equipped with an organ, the Hall also includes a Balcony that can be used as a lecture theatre, accommodating over 200 audiences.
- Chapel: It is open to all members of the College for religious activities, Bible reading, fellowship meetings, or quiet meditation.
- **Library:** The College Library houses a comprehensive collection of books to aid learning.









- Technology Centres: The Computer Rooms, Innovation Centre, E-Learning Centre, and stateof-the-art Computer-Assisted Learning Centre, all equipped with high-speed internet connections, facilitate the integration of technology in learning and teaching.
- Science Laboratories: There are six science laboratories with advanced equipment aimed at nurturing innovation and technology talents.
- Music and Visual Arts Rooms: The College features two purpose-built, acoustically-attuned Music Rooms to nurture students' musical talents, as well as two fully-equipped Visual Arts Rooms for creative skills development.

The School Enhancement Project aims to offer cutting-edge facilities that enhance learning and provide more communal areas for students. The First Stage, completed in June 2019, focused on classroom enlargement and renovation. The Second Stage is currently underway, with the new School Entrance completed and in use as of August 2024. The Multipurpose Hall is designed for exhibiting students' work, organising school activities, and conducting music performances. The Fitness Centre has been available since 2023, while a renovated indoor swimming pool is expected to be ready for use in the first quarter of 2025 for students' physical well-being and development.











Wong Ming Him Hall provides a living link to the College's past in an updated and dignified building. The Second Floor of Wong Ming Him Hall is a meeting room as well as an archival centre. The First Floor is the Rehearsal Room for drama or musical performances. The ground floor, with its open garden setting, can be used for meetings and performances.

The College Hall is a multi-purpose facility with an upto-date AV system. The Hall's Balcony can be turned into a lecture theatre which, with auditorium seating, can comfortably accommodate up to 200 people.

The School Enhancement Project was launched in 2018 with the stated aim of providing state-of-the-art facilities in learning areas, music rooms, athletic facilities, and communal areas. The College is committed to continuously upgrading its physical and human resources to serve our school community.







## **CURRICULUM**

Boys acquire knowledge from a broad range of subjects taught at the College by experienced, qualified, and caring teachers who are devoted whole-heartedly to their profession.

#### **MEDIMUM OF INSTRUCTION**

Students are encouraged to be biliterate and trilingual at the College. All lessons, except Chinese Language, Chinese History and Life Education, are taught in English. A number of native-speaking English teachers provide a language-rich environment for learning. Furthermore, Putonghua is used in all Chinese lessons in selected classes to raise students' proficiency in their national language.

#### **CLASS STRUCTURE**

There are six classes in each of Forms One to Six, and each class usually has thirty students.

#### THE CURRICULUM

The timetable is based on a 5-day weekly cycle, Monday to Friday.

#### **Forms 1-3**

To help students fully develop their intellectual capabilities, the fifteen subject departments at St. Paul's provide a broad curriculum in accordance with the needs, levels and abilities of all students. Students in Forms 1-3 follow a rigorous but balanced curriculum which constantly engages and challenges students to prepare them for more advanced learning.

#### Remarks

- + The six classes of Form One will be streamed for English into 9 groups according to the results of an English Test which will be administrated to all Form 1 applicants. All classes will have the opportunity of being taught Oral English by native-speakers. There are also split English Classes in Form 2.
- \* Class A to F will be streamed into 8 groups, 1-2 group(s) of which will be taught in Putonghua.
- # Putonghua classes are split for more effective teaching.

Students take their IAL examinations at St. Paul's College in Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, and Biology. The students also take GCE A-Level Chinese at the College. External GCS and IAL exams are administered by ITS, our exam service provider. Students may also choose to take their exams with HKEAA (Hong Kong Examinations and Assessment Authority), of which St. Paul's College is a participating school.

In addition to developing students' intellectual capabilities, the College also aims at fostering the development of the whole person. Extra-curricular activities play an integral role in students' lives and every opportunity is provided to extend students' potential.

The Class of 2024 achieved remarkable success in the HKDSE.



87.6 % of our 2024 HKDSE graduates met the general entrance requirements (i.e. "332A22" in the four core subjects and two electives) for JUPAS undergraduate programmes. On average, our students attained Level 5 or above in 3.14 subjects. Our students have continued to perform exceedingly well in the core and elective subjects.

Our top scorer, Yang Feichi, achieved Level 5\*\* in 6 subjects (including M2).

Our students have continued to excel in core and elective subjects. The average percentages of our students obtaining Level 5 or above was 44.2% in the three core subjects and 49.4% in all subjects. 77.6% obtained level 4 or above in the 4 core subjects, 80.8% in all subjects.

## 2024 INTERNATIONAL ADVANCED LEVEL (IAL) EXAMINATION RESULTS

Our fifth cohort of students undertaking the International A-Levels qualification achieved outstanding results in the 2024 IAL Examination. Fourteen of our thirty one IAL graduates of this cohort achieved A\*, the highest grade, in all four of their subjects. Of the 121 grades this cohort achieved, an impressive 82 of them were grade A\*. A remarkable 95% of the grades achieved were either A\* or A. All graduates met the conditions set by their preferred university programmes.

## **MULTIDISCIPLINARY LEARNING**

#### Values Education

Since our founding in 1851, values education has always been at the core of our curriculum as St. Paul's College's mandate is to educate young people of Hong Kong based on Christian principles. As a Christian school, the biblical perspective to values education is essential because it helps people to see the relevance of Christian values to the modern world.





The College has used Christian values as a reference point to unpack the priority values proposed by the Education Bureau. Using the school motto "The Fear of the Lord is the Beginning of Wisdom" as a starting point, we have come up with eight groups of core values that form the basis of values education in St. Paul's College. In addition, as Hong Kong is uniquely positioned as a place where east meets west, we have decided to include both biblical verses and Chinese sayings to illustrate these core values.

#### A Whole-School and Multi-pronged Approach

To enable an effective implementation of values education in St. Paul's College, we adopt a multi-pronged approach to permeate values development in everything that we do including form teacher periods, assembly, formal curriculum and informal curriculum.

We also adopt a whole-school approach because we recognise that it is everyone's responsibility to help students develop a positive value system.

Values Education constitutes a vital component of whole-person education, focusing on cultivating students' appropriate values and attitudes across diverse Key Learning Areas / subjects and through relevant learning experiences. 

#### Form 1 - The Exciting STEAM Journey Begins

In Form 1, we embark on our ICT (Information and Communication Technology) journey. Students are introduced to block programming, Internet of Things (IoT) applications, and Artificial Intelligence (AI) basics. This foundational stage equips students with essential skills for their future STEAM exploration.

#### Form 2 - Unleashing Creativity and problem-solving with App Development

Form 2 brings students deeper into the world of ICT with a keen focus on app development. This module strengthens computational thinking, problem-solving, and programming skills, setting a robust foundation for more advanced studies.

#### Form 4 & 5 - Soaring High with Advanced **STEAM Curriculum**

In Forms 4 and 5, students dive into advanced STEAM topics, covering 3D printing, laser cutting, advanced app writing, IoT device creation, spatial data knowledge, Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Application, and design thinking. These crucial lessons prepare students for university-level STEAM courses and potential careers in these fields.

#### **After-School and Saturday Enrichment** Courses

To broaden our students learning horizon, we offer a variety of engaging after-school and Saturday courses. These include Aerospace and Astronomy, Al programming, flight simulation, AloT, crafting self-driving cars, robotics, drone programming, AR/VR, MetaVerse, entrepreneurship and pitching training, and collaborative programmes with different universities and professional parties such as Ocean Park.

#### **Cross-Disciplinary STEAM Activities**

We believe in holistic learning, which is why we offer unique cross-disciplinary STEAM activities. For instance, our Integrated Science curriculum collaborates with STEAM to host a Maglev Train competition, while our ICT curriculum partners with STEAM for a Smart Weather Observatory project. These integrated activities provide our students with unique learning experiences and encourage a multidisciplinary approach to problemsolving.

#### **Shining through Competitions, Exhibitions,** and Hackathons

We encourage our students, especially the most dedicated and talented, to showcase their skills and creativity through various STEAM competitions, entrepreneurship competitions, exhibitions, and hackathons. These platforms provide invaluable real-world experience, inspire innovation, and allow students to shine.



#### Focus on Sustainable Development Goals and Core Values

Our STEAM curriculum places a strong emphasis on the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), teaching students how STEAM can be harnessed to address global challenges and promote sustainability. Furthermore, our STEAM programme also emphasises our school's core values of Commitment, Compassion, and Citizenship, instilling these essential qualities in our students.



#### SUSTAINABILITY @ SPC

Education for sustainable development is viewed as a cornerstone of global citizenship education, fostering a holistic approach to learning that extends beyond curricular walls. We believe that equipping students with the knowledge, skills, and values necessary for sustainable development not only prepares them for the challenges of tomorrow, but also moulds them into responsible global citizens. Through a curriculum in a multidisciplinary approach that emphasises environmental stewardship, social responsibility, and economic viability, we aim to cultivate a generation of individuals who are not only academically proficient, but also ethically conscious and actively engaged in shaping a more sustainable and peaceful world.

#### **Green Policy**

The school-based Green Policy was established in 2020 to raise awareness of environmental protection among all staff members, students, and parents. The Green Policy is a milestone for stakeholders to adopt a whole-school approach to sustainable development. #### **MUSIC TRAINING**


With a strong musical tradition, the College music teams — including the Senior and Junior Choirs, the Symphony Orchestra, the String Orchestra, the Concert Band, and the Pianist and Organist team — actively participate in various local and overseas festivals and public performances each year. All teams have achieved numerous awards in local and overseas competitions in the past century.

We are one of the earliest schools in Hong Kong to organise overseas tours. Since 2000, our students have gained extensive musical exposure in countries including the UK, Belgium, Germany, Austria, Italy, Australia, and Japan. Every year, our school teams are invited to various Chinese cities for performance tour. The performances of our students have received high praise from overseas musicians and conductors. The College also offers music scholarships and masterclasses to students who demonstrate outstanding performance in the College music teams.

For general music education, the department has designed a comprehensive five-year music curriculum aimed at nurturing students into music lovers with a strong artistic sense. A "one student, one instrument" policy is a requirement of our music curriculum. The music department provides instrumental classes, including organ, percussion, and saxophone ensembles, to enable students to play instruments in school. Students are taught by experienced and professional musicians based in Hong Kong.

#### **ART**

To arouse students' interest in Visual Arts, the College organises visits to local exhibitions, seminars, workshops, painting competitions, and talks by alumni. To maximise learning in art, our school engages students in life-long learning outside the classroom both in Hong Kong and overseas. ## GLOBAL CLASSROOM AND SCHOOL CONNECTIONS

St. Paul's College places great emphasis on the all-round development of students. Cross-disciplinary exchange programmes in mainland China and overseas tours have been organised to enhance students' language and communication skills, cultivate interests, and showcase their talents and strengths. In the 2023-2024 academic year, Principal Mr. Yuen and a group of students travelled to London and Paris to participate in the British Educational Training and Technology (BETT) Show. The College also established a sister school relationship with the High School Affiliated to Southern University of Science and Technology to deepen cultural exchanges between the two regions, enhance technological innovation education, and enable students to practise humanistic values.



The College organised a series of tours with exchange activities aiming at extending collaborative inter-school activities, broadening students' worldviews, and discussing globally relevant issues. These included the Football Training Tour to Spain, Geography Study Tour to Morocco, English Language Study Tour to the United Kingdom, History Study Tour to Germany and Austria, International Band Competition (The 9th Singapore International Band Festival) Tour to Singapore, Music Performance Tour to the United Kingdom, and Sports Team Training Tour to Japan.

St. Paul's College has always been committed to forming partnerships with world-renowned schools such as the High School Affiliated to Shanghai Jiao Tong University, the High School Affiliated to Xi'an Jiaotong University, Christ Church Grammar School in Australia, and Trinity-Pawling School in the United States. The College is currently a member school of the International Boys' Schools Coalition (IBSC), dedicated to unlocking students' various potentials.

The College first held its Academic-in-Residence programme in 2013. The programme offers students extensive opportunities to do research with scholars in their fields of expertise.


We aim to broaden students' horizons, pursue their interests, and achieve their aspirations by actively engaging them in developing methodologies for data analysis.

In the first five years, we have had three research fellows from the University of Cambridge including Dr. Chiara Ciccarelli, who is a Physics research fellow of the Gonville and Caius College, Dr. Phoebe Allan, who holds a PhD in Chemistry and is now also a research fellow at Gonville & Caius College. Dr. Ed Brambley, a lecturer in Applied Mathematics at Gonville and Caius College. Dr. Brambley inspired our students and teachers with his great passion for education. Dr. Brambley also works as a Royal Society University Research Fellow in the Department of Applied Mathematics and Theoretical Physics, University of Cambridge.

In the post-Covid years, we have had two PhD scholars visiting the College. Dr. Joanna Mansbridge, is an Associate Professor of the Faculty of Art in the Chinese University of Hong Kong. She holds a PhD in English from the Graduate Center, City University of New York. Professor Feng Donglai, is an academician of the Chinese Academy of Sciences and a fellow of the American Physical Society. He is currently the director of the National Synchrotron Radiation Laboratory of the University of Science and Technology of China, the Executive Dean of the School of Nuclear Science and Technology, and the President of ShanghaiTech University. He holds a PhD in Physics from Stanford University.





#### **ARTIST-IN-RESIDENCE (MUSIC)**

The Artist-in-Residence programme invites leading figures in the fields of Music and Performing Arts from around the world to collaborate with our teachers and students at the College.

Over the past decades, world-renowned musicians from various parts of the globe, including vocalists, organists, instrumentalists, conductors, and professors, have been invited to coach our music teams and perform alongside our students in public performances. They also engage with students in the classroom and deliver speeches during morning assembly, sharing valuable insights and experiences.

In the future, the College aims to strengthen ties with esteemed professors and masters from around the world, including those from the Royal College of Music and the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts, to provide our students with a broader perspective on music and the performing arts.

#### STUDENT CARE

#### PREFECTS' COUNCIL

It is led by a Head Prefect and two Second Head Prefects appointed by the Principal. With the assistance of Committee Prefects, Senior Prefects, and other Prefects carefully chosen from F.3 to F.5, the Prefects' Council strives to uphold the name of the school and serve with honour as role models to ensure a harmonious and effective learning environment for all students.

Its mission is to maintain internal discipline within the College, and to nurture leaders of tomorrow on campus and in society. It acts as a bridge and seeks to establish a closer relationship between students and the school. It also aims to keep the school a harmonious place to teach and study in.

Apart from routine duties like taking the roll call, performing uniform checks, and patrolling, the Prefects also assist the College in organising various major school events, such as the Swimming Gala, Sports Day, Speech Day, Parents' Day, etc. They also serve as the school's ambassadors on Form 1 Admission Briefing, Form 1 Admission Day, Form 1 Registration Day and on many others. SPC Prefects have received high praise from guests, teachers, and parents for the dedication and high standards they displayed at all these events.

The Prefects' Council seeks to nurture talent and develop leaders. Distinguished prefect alumni have made notable contributions to society and have attained outstanding achievements in different fields such as medicine, law, and public service.

#### THE HOUSE SYSTEM

The House System helps to bridge the gap between junior and senior form students and develop a sense of brotherhood. Each of the six Houses – Banyan, Ginkgo, Oak, Pine, Rosewood and Yew – comprises students from different levels. We will continue to uphold the school's vision and mission to nurture future generations with a whole-person development approach and foster brotherhood among alumni. #### ST. PAUL'S COLLEGE PRIMARY SCHOOL

Governed by the St. Paul's College Council, St. Paul's College Primary School is a whole-day primary boys' school affiliated to St. Paul's College under the Direct Subsidy Scheme. There is a total of 6 levels from Junior Class 1 to Junior Class 6. Currently, the School has 60 staff members including the Headmaster, the Deputy Heads, senior teachers, full-time teachers, native-speaking English teachers, a librarian, a student guidance counsellor, I.T. technicians, clerical staff and janitors.

The Primary School relocated from Hill Road to Victoria Road and started its operation at the new site in January 2013. The new campus houses twenty-four standard classrooms, six small teaching rooms, an assembly hall, two computer rooms, two music rooms, two language rooms, two visual arts rooms, a science room, media studio, chapel, library, parent resource room, student activity room, two playgrounds, multi-purpose areas, green roofs, and a large school-bus pick-up and drop-off area.

The majority of JC6 students continue with their secondary school education at St. Paul's College. The Primary School has strong ties with St. Paul's College, working towards the common goal of "One College, One Family".

### ST. PAUL'S COLLEGE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION (SPCAA)







The Alumni Association gives unfailing support to the College.

St. Paul's College has had its own "Old Boys Union" since the 1920s. First established to help Paulines maintain ties with their Alma Mater, it was only after the end of World War II that this union was formally named "St. Paul's College Alumni Association" (SPCAA).

The major aims of the Association are to foster a stronger sense of brotherhood among alumni and establish closer connections with the Alma Mater. Over the years, the Alumni Association has been very active in helping the College and student development. These include raising funds for the expansion of the College, setting up scholarships for students and organising activities benefitting the boys.

#### TWIN-SCHOOL PROGRAMME

In line with the vision of the Global Classroom, the Twinschool Programme aims to expand our students' global perspectives, and build links between teachers and students of leading schools around the world through various exchange activities and mutual visits.

St. Paul's College has formally established twin-school relationship with the High School Affiliated to Shanghai Jiao Tong University (上海交通大學附屬中學), High School Affiliated to Xian Jiao Tong University (西安交通大學附屬中學) and High School Affiliated to Southern University of Science and Technology (深圳南方科技大學附屬中學).

We are now considering links with outstanding schools in Beijing, Shenzhen, Singapore, Japan, Canada, the United Kingdom, and the United States as the next stage in our twin-school programme.
